If there is one word that defines 2025 for our community, it is steadfast.

The past year tested organic agriculture in new ways. Federal funding freezes created uncertainty. Trade disruptions rippled through supply chains. Long-standing programs faced new scrutiny. Farmers once again found themselves navigating shifting ground—economically, politically, and environmentally.

And yet, across the country, organic farmers continued to do what they have always done: adapt, innovate, and lead. At OFRF, we stood with them. We showed up in the field, in Washington D.C., and in virtual and in-person spaces where farmers were gathering with science-backed resources and information to share.

We brought farmer stories directly to lawmakers and agency staff. We expanded the reach of farmer-led research so that practical, field-tested solutions could spread faster. We launched the Organic Research Hub so farmers and researchers could more easily access credible, science-based knowledge when they needed it most. And we deepened our commitment to ensuring that organic agriculture is not only resilient, but equitable and accessible.

This was not a year of flashy wins. It was a year of quiet, determined work—protecting hard-won progress while continuing to build toward a stronger future.

Organic agriculture has always required courage: the courage to farm differently, to question the status quo, to invest in long-term soil health, even when short-term pressures mount. In 2025, we saw that courage reflected across our entire community.

When we invest in organic research, education, and advocacy, we are investing in more than a production system. We are investing in healthy soil, thriving rural communities, climate resilience, fairness, and the future of food.

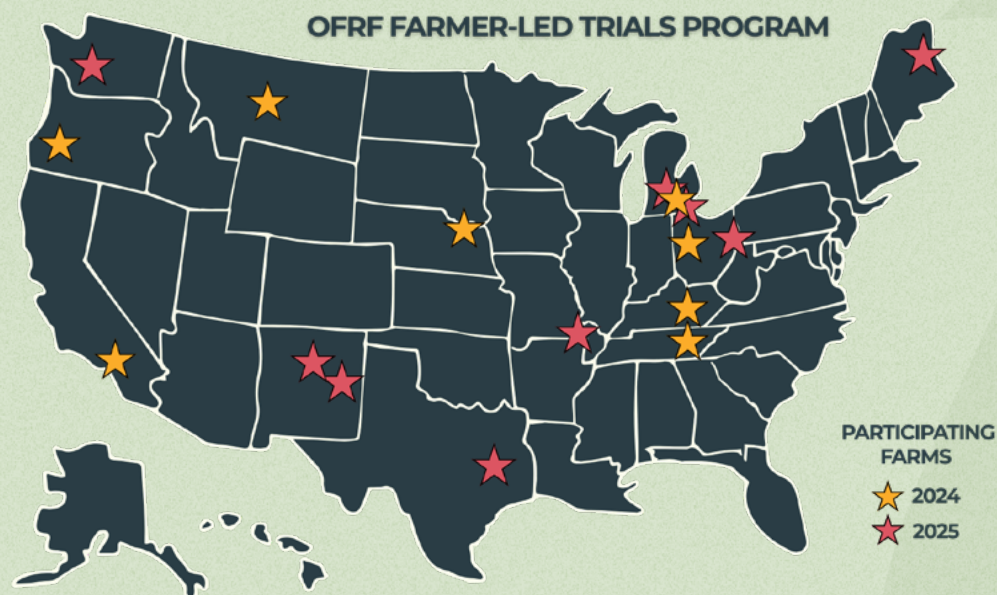
SHOWING UP IN THE FIELD

Through the [Farmer-Led Trials](#) program, new ideas are tested in real-world conditions and shared across the community—turning individual experience into collective progress.

ORGANIC & NRCS

Natural Resource and Conservation (NRCS) staff showed up with a desire to better understand organic systems—asking how they could more effectively support farmers as they navigate conservation programs. Farmers showed up with real-world experience—demonstrating what conservation looks like on working organic farms.

OFRF BROUGHT THOSE GROUPS TOGETHER.

Through training and [webinars](#) with OFRF, NRCS staff gained practical insights into organic production, from [research-backed practices](#) to [real-world farm examples](#). At the same time, we worked with farmers across the country to share their stories—highlighting how conservation programs can be used, adapted, and improved for organic systems.

The result is more than knowledge. It's alignment—between the people stewarding land and the systems designed to support them.

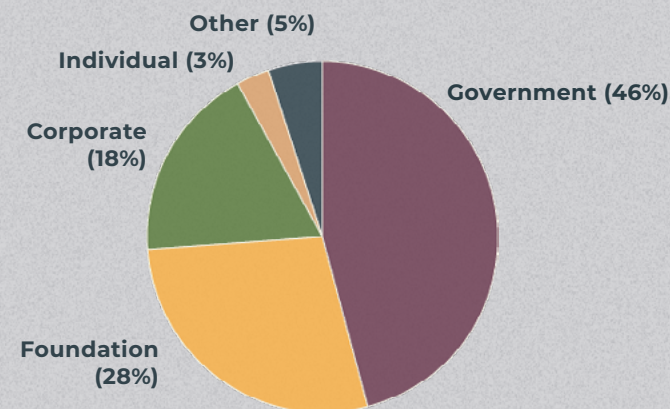

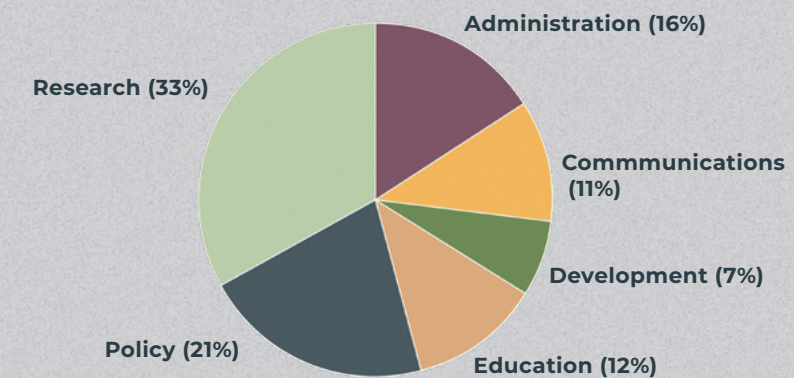
